President's Report



The region has seen a 10 percent participation increase this season with strong numbers building in our juniors across all regional clubs.

Congratulations to everyone who has been involved in swimming in Far North Queensland over the past 12 months and what a year it has been. FNQ Swimming's strategic role is to increase participation opportunities and performance pathways for competitive swimming in Far North Queensland.

The region has seen a 10 percent participation increase this season with strong numbers building in our juniors across all clubs. Through the concerted effort by coaches, parents, and volunteers we are seeing clubs rebuilding and strengthening throughout the region with Tully, Innisfail, Mossman, and Normanton swimmers now competitively involved in carnivals and winning medals at the FNQ Championships.

A special mention must go to the committee at Cooktown Swimming Club which held its first regional carnival in 17 years with more than 100 swimmers in attendance on the ANZAC Day long weekend. The success of the two-day event highlighted that grass roots development swimming is in demand. In attendance were some of our National and Olympic Qualifying level swimmers both competing and providing coaching at the clinic the following morning.

This year saw record numbers of swimmers qualifying and competing at events outside the region. More than 60 FNQ swimmers competed at the December 2020 Queensland State Championships in Brisbane, demonstrating the depth of talent being developed by so many of clubs. April 2021 saw a record 25 FNQ swimmers qualify for Age and Open Australian National Swimming Championships on the Gold Coast. Finally, eight FNQ swimmers qualified to compete at the June 2021 Olympic Trials in Adelaide, which was a highlight of Swimming Australia's calendar, and an outstanding achievement for our young athletes coming through.

FNQ Swimming has this year joined with the Cairns Academy of Sport (through TAFE Qld) to provide further opportunities for our senior swimmers to remain in FNQ and continue their training and education upon completion of secondary schooling. The opportunity to become a part of a high performance program with other elite athletes based in FNQ is another strategy to improve the retention of swimmers in our sport. Swimming Australia was instrumental in assisting with the planning of multiple events conducted in FNQ during mid-2021 to coincide with the Australian Dolphins training camp in Cairns prior to the 2021 Tokyo Olympics. We would like to thank the team from Swimming Australia for their commitment to providing world-class opportunities for our local swimmers.

On behalf of the FNQ Swimming community I would like to thank Swimming Queensland's team for their ongoing support administratively, with swimmer and coach development and for their unwavering advocacy for the return to competitive swimming through the COVID pandemic. A special mention must go to Brant Best who has been instrumental in growing the continued local collaboration amongst our coaches/clubs, accelerated technical skill development both in and out of the water and generally supported our improvement goals throughout the region. You are one of us now. Finally, I would like to thank the FNQ Swimming Committee, Technical Officials, and those of you providing much needed time and skill in the background for all your hard work and incredible dedication that helped make the season 2020/21 such a success.

Graduating Swimmers





THE BUTTERFLY EFFECT

IKE'S OLYMPIC DREAM

A strict routine revolving around swim training and schoolwork, self-belief and the support of his parents and TAS club 'family' are the mainstays that keep Australian age champion lke Martinez on track for a date with the 2024 Paris Olympics.

At 14, the year nine Trinity Anglican School student is the best age group 200m butterfly swimmer in Australia. In June he raced against the nation's best – most at least three years older than him - at the Australian Olympic Swimming trials in Adelaide and finished sixth in the B Final.

His time of 2:03.76 places him third in the Top 10 Australian All-Time for 14 years. He came within 0.7 seconds of toppling Olympian Ian Thorpe's 25-year record for his age and was the 14th fastest swimmer at the meet

Ike's drive saw him happily undertake a 20-hours a week training schedule in the pool and gym before and after school in the lead up to the Olympic trials.

Coach Duncan Todd, a former Olympian, used the trials to introduce his talented charge to a new level, to experience a different atmosphere and an opportunity that comes around once every four years.

"I am pretty happy with what I achieved, it's pretty awesome and good to know that my hard work paid off," Ike said.

"These Olympic trials were more of an experience for me with the best of the best. Next time I will be 17 so it will be focusing on the Olympics and possibly even medals."

With the big meets for 2021 concluded, Ike returned to the TAS pool with an eye on the calendar as well as the clock in the hopes of smashing the "Thorpedo" record before his 15th birthday in October. This record would complement the Australian Long Course 200m butterfly record Ike set as a 13 year old – the fastest ever in Australian swimming history.

"Ian Thorpe was a great athlete and Olympian and it's good to aspire to beat his records. I am pretty close at the moment."

Two months before the Olympic trials lke blitzed the National Age Championships at the Gold Coast, claiming five gold medals, a silver and a bronze, and setting six new personal best times across his eight events.

He shaved three seconds off the Queensland 800m freestyle record and nine seconds off his personal best in a time of 8:25.75, finishing 23 seconds ahead of his pearest rival

Ike attributes his focus, discipline and motivation to the help of his parents, who work in the medical industry, his "awesome" coach Duncan Todd and watching clips of Olympic legend Michael Phelps. "It's great to have someone like Phelps to look up to.

"I am still growing and not anywhere near my peak so hopefully I will get there (to the Olympics)." Ike is sponsored by Funky Trunks and he was delighted to meet other "F-Teamers" at the Olympic trials.

"It was good to meet Brendan Smith who made the Olympic team. That was cool. And I talked to Isaac Cooper for quite a while. Funky Trunks give me products to try out, like clothing and swimwear. It's cool stuff and it's been really awesome.

"My club pretty much is my family and that helps with motivation and training, swimming with friends like Lauren Morris, Ella Goddard and Albert Damin An. He is really good to swim against. He's very competitive and won two bronze medals at Nationals in the 400IM and 200 breaststroke."

Cairns-born Ike turns to the alto sax to relax. "I've been playing five years and it's great to have another hobby outside of swimming. I am preparing for the Grade 8 AMEB examination. Music gives me an option for a career path once I retire from competitive swimming."



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

CELEBRATING 60 YEARS OF REGIONAL SWIMMING IN FAR NORTH QUEENSLAND





A LASTING LEGACY

FNQ Swimming's history starts in 1961 at which time Sir Thomas Covacevich became the first President. Since then, the Far North Queensland region has grown to 19 clubs and spans an area in Queensland from Tully in the South, to Weipa and Cooktown in the North. The region's clubs collectively have a membership of around 1000 swimmers ranging from learn-to-swim through to novice and on to the more competitive higher performing A grade swimmers.

Over the past 15 years, the organisation has continued to evolve, with its focus remaining on fostering the next generation of young swimmers while providing competitive pathways for those looking to take the next step in their swimming journey. Through a strategic partnership with Swimming Queensland, FNQ Swimming's active target squad programs, provide opportunities for personal growth and development for swimmers of all ages. Today, the High Performance and State Development squads have some of the highest numbers in its history.



Crocodiles, Jelly Fish and a Near Miss - How Swimming Evolved in Far North Queensland

The history of FNQRSA is closely linked with that of the Cairns Amateur Swimming Club, which dates back to the early 1900s when it operated in a fairly unstructured form. The 1922 committee was the first formal committee of the club. The president was Bob Lebas, who is well remembered for helping to build the mud pool on the Cairns Esplanade.

Cairns swimmers in those days didn't have the luxuries of swimming pools - to train they had to swim among the jellyfish, or the local "wildlife" in Alligator Creek or the Mulgrave River in Gordonvale.

A huge step forward for regional swimming was identifying a site on the Cairns Esplanade for a pool. The land was donated by the Cairns City Council and the Harbour Board gave use of its pontoon for the transport of the logs. The basic mud pool served the club for a number of years but was unfortunately destroyed by a cyclone two days after the final payment for its construction Swimmers then used any of three wire enclosures on the Esplanade. Harry Hill's pool in front of the R.S.L was one of the favourites because it was well maintained. A near crocodile miss hastened the erection of the "new" pool, which was opened in 1930 and served the Cairns club for 32 years.

Just as our swimmers today enjoy a close rivalry with Townsville, so did they. Championships were hosted by both cities, as competition heated up over the next three decades. The war years saw a slight recess, but once the troops had shipped out, swimming was able to resume. In 1952 the North Queensland Championships were held in Townsville. Cairns took a large team and won the aggregate from Townsville Tourists, 188 to 126 points. Cairns' dominance continued throughout the decade.

The first important swimming event of the 1960s was the Olympian Swim Meet when the Olympic Swimmers travelled north from Townsville to stimulate a continued interest in swimming in Cairns. A short time later, these athletes competed at the Olympic Games in Rome. The next big move of the 1960s was the transition to Tobruk Pool.

It was the first time many had swum in chlorinated water. The most outstanding swimmer of this decade was John Covacevich, whose father Sir Thomas Covacevich was president of the club for many years. He was also the founding president of the Far North Queensland Amateur District Swimming Association (FNQADSA now FNQRSA) and continued in the position of Patron for many years. During this time, John was to make five Queensland records and one Australian record

John Covacevich also founded the Cairns Triathlon, which was first held in 1981. He was so engulfed in striving to establish himself in his career as a local solicitor, he had neglected his weight and fitness. John founded a running club, becoming the self-appointed, president, secretary, PR officer and every other role required in those early days. It took 18 months to get himself into shape, eventually clocking a 2 hour 51 minute marathon and low 34 minutes for 10km - not bad for a swimmer. John cemented his name in the triathlon history books and winners list – taking out his own event. - and like his father, gave his time and passion generously to local sport.

While the driving force behind the establishment of the Far FNQADSA is not clear, it is assumed that it was a general understanding and agreement that an all-encompassing association was necessary to grow swimming and provide opportunities for the next generations.

This foresight has created a strong legacy of swimming in Far North Queensland and it is with great honour FNQRSA continues to recognise Sir Thomas Covacevich's spirit, courage, dedication and commitment to the sport of swimming with the annual perpetual trophy.

The award recognises achievement, but regards commitment to the sport and the continuous dedication to strive, as a measure of outstanding excellence. Recipients of this award include Mercedes Bowen 2013, Daniel Simpson 2014, Nathan Lang 2015, Ryan Clark 2016, Leanne Davidson 2017, Ella Goddard 2020, and Joel Mundie 2018 and 2021.

Life Member Inductees

KATHY HARE

When Kathy Hare took her son Jack to TAS to learn to swim in 2001, she had no idea it was the first stroke of a volunteer commitment that would take her all over Australia as poolside witness to the rise of some of our finest young athletes.

"Jack's coach basically said you will be joining the club. He had some talent and like a good parent I went along for the ride. After a couple of carnivals I was committed. I joined the TAS committee in 2002 and became a Technical Official and Delegate in 2003 when club member Dr Roxanne Wu said she needed someone to help her on the technical side," Kathy recalls.

Kathy's commitment over the past two decades includes both poolside officiating and behind the scenes administration. She was Treasurer of FNQ Swimming 2005-2014 and President 2014-2017; in 2019 she became Chief Referee, in 2020 she continued as a Committee Member and Technical Official Representative. She has been a Swimming Queensland and Swimming Australia Technical Official since 2010.

Her 'day job' is Finance Manager at Gindaja Treatment & Healing Indigenous Corporation at Yarrabah, and she has a consultancy in data management and financial bookkeeping specialising in Indigenous not for profit organisations. She believes her "mathematical brain" is a good fit with being a swimming Technical Official.

"Basically I just love the opportunity to give back, but being a Technical Official is also the best seat in the house. I started off in the Control Room. You see the joy and disappointment on the swimmers' faces and you see the results and think, my gosh, you are disappointed and you just did that!"

Highlights of her commitment to the global swimming family include her first time on the pool deck when sprinter Ashley Callus broke a Commonwealth record at Chandler Aquatic Centre, winning Games selection. Another was the 2018 Pan Pacific Para Swimming Championships in Cairns.

"It was a highlight of my career when this international meet was held in my home town. It was one of the most exciting meets I have ever been to," she said.

Kathy says she is "quite chuffed" with Life Membership recognition of FNQ Swimming Association. "I am honoured and appreciative and humbled by the fact I have been recognised because there are so many people who put so much into swimming.

"I do it because I love it. As Chief Referee you are out there in the face of everybody but I am quite happy to just do my thing." Kathy is passionate about the opportunity to 'Close The Gap' through enabling and supporting Indigenous swimmers, particularly those from rural areas, to be part of competitive swimming.

"If we can raise the level of interest in places like Hopevale, which has a beautifully developed pool, we have the opportunity to get some structure around them and essentially close that gap. ... I am keen to support them to get some good swimming happening."













Matt Bromley admits it was inevitable the swimming world would become part of life when he married into the swimming Howard family. Nearly 20 years later, the timeline of his experiences in the sport reads like a list of exciting volunteer PBs.



"Since 2003 as a parent with three kids at Trinity Aquatics (now TAS Swimming) when he began local officiating within the region, he has achieved National Level 3 Referee accreditation and reached the pinnacle of FINA Technical Official accreditation, officiating and refereeing around Australia and overseas.

Along the way he co-founded the Central Cairns Swimming Club and was the club's inaugural President and Grants Officer from 2004-2012. Despite the demands of "giving back" in a world of disappearing volunteers, Matt has a full time position managing a unit of ICT staff for Qld Health, providing information and communication technology support to health services from around Cardwell north.

"I took on the role of officiating at swim meets because trying to get volunteers is like pulling teeth, it's bloody hard," Matt said. He acknowledges standing at a pool for eight hours in the heat can be challenging, especially running a meet over a couple of days. And officiating at distant meets presents its own set of challenges.

"But we have got some kids and coaches on that national stage. If you put your mind to it, and effort, and are a little patient about it, you can go a long way with it. ... Distance doesn't have to be a barrier. Having your partner there and being able to experience some of these things together is really good."

Matt says he was taken aback to be recognised with Life Membership of FNQ Swimming Association. "I look around and see people who are involved and think maybe they should be recognised before me. I wasn't expecting it and I am humbled by it," he said. Looking back, a high point was receiving an Australian Institute of Sport National Officiating Scholarship in 2012. This provided elite official mentorship and mental and physical support to prepare for accreditation and coaching on the national and international stage.

"Going to the AIS was just phenomenal. I really enjoy the big stuff and going to events like the Pan Pacs but doing the local events is really good as well. "The thing I get the biggest kick out of is really just working with little kids, the six to 12 year olds, teaching them how swimming is and what their stroke is. It's very satisfying seeing a local kid get up to the national events and their coaches, knowing you have had a little bit to do with them through officiating."
